# Reflection 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday B. Mk 1:21-28.

As Jesus was preaching in the synagogue at Capernaum, a poor demented man created a scene. He cried out, "What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? In effect what the man was saying was, "Leave me alone! I'm good. I'm evil. I'm not worthy to love or care. It is a cry we hear more than once in secular society: God get out of my life, out of schools, out of my home, out of society "Don't meddle, interfere with us. Leave us alone. Don't try to change us". We recognised that change is painful. They are so many sick, broken, isolated, unloved people, who had no dignity and whose self-worth is nil but don't give God chance to restore them to health and dignity of his children.

People find it hard to admit that they can't manage their problems. Pride tells them: I should be able to handle my own problems. Recognition that there is a problem is the first step towards rehabilitation. The acknowledgement of our weakness is the beginning of healing and recovery. Sometimes people don't really want to be cured. Why is this? Because a cure can be painful. It involves a process which requires a lot of change, and all change is painful. We all seek to hide what is strange and painful, and to act as if things are normal. This urges to hide is very powerful, and can be more harmful than what it tries to conceal. It is by showing our wounds, by allowing ourselves to touch and be touched that we are healed. Let's give God chance to heal us.

The ashes are a sacramental, indicating our interior desire to repent and believe in the gospel and our intention to follow this faith through Lent in order to celebrate the Lord's Paschal Mystery, renewed in faith and more closely united in our love of the Lord and of each other.

As in recent years we will keep this as a special day of prayer here in the Church in Scotland for all who have suffered abuse of whatever kind. The National Liturgy Commission will again prepare reflections and prayers for our use on that day.
