

Reflection: 12th Sunday of the Year - A

There is such a thing as a holy fear. The Bible says, 'Fear of God is the beginning of wisdom.' It means the fear of displeasing God, the fear of losing God, the fear of eternal damnation. These can be powerful motivation forces. Fear sometimes has a protective function, warning us of the presence of danger. In this case, fear is a grace. Jesus is not telling us that we should base our relationship with God on fear. Rather, He is urging us to base it on trust. He says, 'Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one sparrow falls to the ground without your Father knowing. So do not be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows.' What Jesus is doing is trying to move us from fear to trust. Fear creates suspicion, distance, defensiveness and insecurity. Trust leads to closeness, intimacy, and a sense of safety. Good religion makes a person fearless. Bad religion increases one's fears.

When Jesus says, 'Not one sparrow falls to the ground without your Father knowing,' he wants us to know how far-reaching and all-embracing is the knowledge and care of God. Everything that happens to any of his creatures, even the most insignificant of them, is seen by God and is important to him-yes, even the fall of a single sparrow. The fact that he doesn't prevent this fall, doesn't mean that he is indifferent to it. God is never indifferent about the fate of any of his creatures. If then God is concerned about the sparrow, we can be sure that he is concerned about us who are his children. Still, we have no guarantee that nothing bad will ever happen to us. However, we believe that even should death come, God will take care of us. Faith is not a comforting illusion that all is well. Rather, it means to know that life is full of risk, full of insecurity, and yet we rejoice in it. That is the essence of faith.



Saints of the Week

Tuesday 27th June St Cyril of Alexandria was born in Egypt. He became Bishop of Alexandria in 412. It was a ferment of various cultures, and tensions erupted from time to time. In his efforts to defend Christians and orthodox teaching he could, in his younger days, take strong and controversial actions. At the Council of Ephesus in 431 he championed the doctrine that our Lady is the Mother of God. He was endowed with a sharp intellect and his spiritual writings are considered of great value, for which he was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1882.

Wednesday 28th **June St Irenaeus c**ame from Smyrna, present-day Izmir, Turkey, where the

bishop was St Polycarp, one of the last to have known St John, the longest-surviving Apostle. Irenaeus emphasised the importance of the unbroken succession of bishops since the time of the Apostles as a guarantee of orthodox teaching. He became a missionary at Lyon. He was its second bishop. Tradition says he died a martyr about the year 200, On January 20 2022, he was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church by Pope Francis.

Thursday 29th June St Peter & St Paul

St Peter originally Simon, son of John, brother of St Andrew, from Bethsaida in Galilee, married, a fisherman to trade, has his call from Jesus recorded in all four Gospels. With James and John, he makes up the threesome taken by Jesus with him on special occasions. He recognises Jesus as "the Christ, the son of the living God" and Jesus gives him the new name Peter "and on this rock I will build my Church" The Gospels witness to his growing authority among the apostles. Tradition has him as the first Bishop of Antioch before settling in Rome where he was crucified during the persecution instigated by the Emperor Nero in the year 64.

St Paul originally Saul, was from Tarsus, present-day Southern Turkey. He arrived in Jerusalem shortly after Our Lord's time and became a student of the rabbinical school of Gamaliel. He was present at the stoning of St Stephen. After this "Damascus moment" conversion he was treated with suspicion by Jews and Christians alike. Barnabas brought him to Antioch. That became his base for his three great missionary journeys. Tradition has him dying a martyr's death in Rome in the year 67.

Friday 30 June the First Martyrs of the Roman

Church are those who died in the persecution instigated by the Emperor Nero. It was the first persecution of several which Roman Emperors periodically inflicted over the next 250 years. According to the Roman historian Tacitus, Nero used the Christians as a scapegoat to blame for the disastrous fire which destroyed two -thirds of Rome in the year 64.
