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

Reflection

Trinity Sunday A. The trinity is the revelation of one God-substance, in three persons.

God alone reveals the Trinity since it is the mystery of his very being. Human reason can know that there is a God; but we cannot know God as he knows himself except from what God has revealed.

Jesus Christ reveals the relationship of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, as distinct divine persons. The Father is not the Son, the Son is not the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit is not the Father. Each divine person can properly say 'I', as when Jesus says: 'I and the Father are one. Nevertheless, the relations within the Trinity differ from those among human persons. Our relationships are changeable, and are established from person to person over time. By contrast, the relations of the divine persons are the very being or 'substance' of God. They are eternal and unchanging. This unity of substance and distinction of persons is expressed in the Trinitarian formula of St Gregory Nazianzus.

This mystery of trinity has an impact on human beings, as God's creatures. None of us likes to be left out. For instance, a wedding is coming up to which we expect to be invited. However, when the invitations are sent out, we don't receive one. We are hurt, we feel excluded. We feel we are not wanted. Of course, we have to look at ourselves and see how generous we are when it comes to inviting other people in. From time-to-time people come to our door. Some we dismiss immediately, barely exchanging a word with them. Others we have a polite but brief chat with at the door, without bringing them into the house. Others we bring into the parlour where we talk about our business, and when that business is concluded we show them to the door. But there are a select few whom we welcome, invite in immediately, and offer

them food and drink. God invites us to share in the life of the Trinity. God doesn't exclude us. He doesn't talk to us at the door steps. He invites us to come in and sit at the table. He wants to share his life with us.

God is a family of three. Three persons in communion one related to the other. From all this we see that God is a God of love, a God of tenderness and compassion, slow to anger, rich in kindness and faithfulness.' Our response can only be one of trust in God and love towards one another. What St Paul said to the Corinthians is meant also for us. 'Help one another. Be united, live in peace, and the God of love and peace will be with you.

We will be praying that we may encounter, as Mary did, the world and its people in a spirit of service and with Jesus' presence.

May Mary be the model of the Catholic faith that by her prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we will become ever more involved in a missionary shift to bring to our society, the Joy of the Gospel that arises from the Eucharist, source and summit of the life of the Church.

May Jesus Christ always be the centre of our life and of our commitment. May He bless you

and keep you faithful to the Mass and to the Adoration.

Many thanks to Father Bernard for covering our services this week while I have been away.

Your help is a greatly appreciated.

St Boniface became a monk at Exeter and in 1719 went as a missionary to present-day Germany. With papal support, he re-organised the Church there after a prolonged period of civil unrest and is greatly venerated still today as “the Apostle of the Germans”. His work is considered to have had a consolidating and pacifying effect on the Europe of his day. On a mission to Friesland, he and his fifty-two fellow missionaries were surprised by robbers who put them to death, after St Boniface urged no resistance but to “overcome evil with good”

Tuesday 6th June St Norbert – Memorial

St Norbert was brought up in a well-to-do family in Rhineland. He lived a comfortable, self indulgent lifestyle until he was thrown from his horse in a thunderstorm. He converted to a severely ascetic way of life and was ordained a priest in 1115. Pope Gelasius II gave him permission to be an itinerant preacher, This led to France where, in 1120, he established his White Canons at Premontre, also known as Norbertines or Premonstratensians, intended to help with the reform of the clergy who he had found on his journey to be of poor morale. In 1126 he was appointed Archbishop of Madgeburg. He was hugely unpopular with priests and people because of his reforming zeal, but persevered until he died in 1134, aged 54.

Friday 9th June St Columba - Feast

St Columba, Abbot, was born of royal blood in Gartan, County Donegal. In the year 563 he left Iona where he founded a monastery from which the Faith was preached in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. He died in 597 and was buried in Iona
