Happy World Day for all Grandparents and the Elderly

This is a celebration established by Pope Francis throughout the Church. It is held on the fourth Sunday of July, near the feast of Sts. Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus. The first World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly was on July 25, 2021, with the theme "I am with you always". The celebration emphasises the pastoral care of the elderly, their mission of evangelisation and prayer, and their intergenerational relationship with young people. The World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly is part of the Year of Amoris Laetitia Family, which began on March 19, 2021, and concluded in June of 2022.

Reflection 16th Sunday A. Weeds among the wheat.

There have always been two views of the Church, one exclusive, the other inclusive. The exclusive view holds that the church is for good people, the fully committed. In the inclusive view, the church must be open to all, to the hot, the cold and the lukewarm, to saints and sinners. For some, the presence of sinners in the church is a cause of scandal. If they had their way, only saints would be admitted. The emergence of paedophiles among the clergy has thrown the Church into turmoil in recent times. A church that admitted only saints would be like a hospital that admitted only people who are well. The church is not a museum for saints, but a school for sinners.

The issue of sinners in the Church was a big one in the early Church too. So how did they approach it? Some were for weeding sinners out. But others turned to the example of Jesus for guidance. First of all, they had his practice to guide them. Not only did he not exclude sinners, he welcomed them. He declared that he had come, not to call the just, but sinners to repentance. Then they had his teaching to guide them. The parable about the field in which wheat and weeds grow together until the harvest was a response to this very question. The Church is a mixed bag. It must not play God by trying to purify itself completely through purges and inquisitions. The definitive separation must be left to the last judgement, to God alone. Everybody will answer to him for their deeds.

We must not despair but know that the world is a mixture of good and evil, of darkness and light. Evil has to be resisted, but we have to do so in such a way that we do not do further evil in the process. Evil can only be overcome by good.

Saints of the week

Monday 24th July St Sharbel Makhluf (1828-1898), born in Lebanon to a Maronite – Catholic family. As a shepherd boy living a lonely life, he loved to pray; soon he became a monk in a Maronite monastic order. Their lifestyle stressed asceticism, prayer and penance rather than community. In fact from 1875, he lived the austere life of a hermit. The cures at his tomb have earned him the reputation of 'Miracle Monk of Lebanon'

Tuesday 25th July St James the Greater (i.e the elder of the two apostles called James) and his brother John, while working on their father's boat on the shore of the Sea of Galilee, promptly obeyed Christ's call to follow him. The two brother, who Jesus nicknamed the Sons of Thunder, formed with Cephas (nicknamed Peter) the trio whom Jesus often had closest to him. After Pentecost, the history of James is told in popular belief; that he went to Spain to preach the gospel and, on a return visit to Jerusalem, was arrested and suffered martyrdom under Herod Agrippa in AD 44; that his body was taken back to Spain and buried where now the great cathedral of Santiago ('St James') de Compostela still draws pilgrims in their thousands.

Wednesday 25th July St Joachim and St Anne are

the names given to the parents of Our Blessed Lady and, therefore, grandparents of Jesus, according to a second- century tradition. Pope Francis has declared them to be patrons of grandparents.

Saturday 29th July Saints Martha, Mary &

Lazarus. These three siblings lived in Bethany, just outside Jerusalem, and were friends of Jesus. On one visit, Jesus had Mary sitting at his feet and listening to him when Martha complained that she was not helping her to prepare the meal. Jesus chided Martha, telling her that her sister 'had chosen the better part' Later, we hear the graphic account of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead to the delight of the two sisters. Pope Francis decreed that henceforth the three siblings should share this feast day.
