Reflection 14th Sunday A.

14th **Sunday A, Jesus reveals the Father.** It gives us joy to know an important person. To really know means to have a relationship with the person, a relationship based on trust and love.

Some people see God as distant and remote, not really concerned about us and our suffering. Worse still, others see God as judge or a spy ready to pounce and punish. Jesus knows the Father and is known by the Father. This fills him with joy. Because Jesus knows the Father, he is able to reveal him to others, especially to those who, like children, are open and receptive. Jesus revealed God as a loving, compassionate, forgiving Father; a God who is passionately interested in us. A God whose concern is not to judge and condemn, but to heal and to save. Many of the so-called wise people rejected Jesus, but the simple people accepted him. The intellectuals had little use for him. But the humble accepted him. Intellectual pride is a dangerous thing.

Jesus said, 'I bless you, Father, for hiding these things from the learned and the clever and revealing them to mere children.' Jesus is not condemning intellectual power, but intellectual pride. It is not cleverness that shuts God out; it is pride. It is not stupidity that enables God to come in; it is humility. When faith is a matter of the head alone, it becomes a cold, intellectual thing. The result is that God remains outside us, a distant, aloof figure. But faith is not just a matter of the head. It is more a matter of the heart. When Faith is rooted in the heart, God is seen as close and loving. Then faith becomes a warm relationship with God. To know God in this way, and to have a close and loving relationship with him, should be the cause of great joy to us. God is like a spring within us which we can drink and refresh ourselves.



Motherwell Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes

Motherwell Diocese will go on Pilgrimage to Lourdes from 14th to 21st July. This will be the first Diocesan Pilgrimage since 2018, and the Bishop along with the 150 pilgrims are very much looking forward to visiting Lourdes again, starting afresh this great Diocesan tradition. The Motherwell Hospitality will care for pilgrims who need extra assistance, assisted by the Alma Group of Young People led by Fr Mark O'Donnell.



World Youth Day in Lisbon

Statement on Diocesan Prolife Mission

Dear brothers and sisters,

As you know, the Church in Scotland recently marked the annual Day for Life. This came as a timely opportunity for us all to rededicate ourselves to the Gospel of Life and to reflect on our own commitment to this vital cause. Soon after the Day for Life, I convened a meeting in the diocesan centre to begin discussions around re-energising our own prolife mission here in the diocese. I listened to those who contributed to a fruitful discussion about the provision of more spiritual and catechetical opportunities and more practical support to those who need our help, especially in the area of crisis pregnancy.

The Marriage and Family Life office is currently coordinating the next meeting of this Working Group which will take place on Thursday 10th August at 7pm in the Diocesan Centre. This meeting is open to everyone and anyone. The plan is to formalise a prolife mission for our diocese and to build upon the key priorities which the group identified. Broadly speaking, these are:

- 1. To setup parish prolife cells with a prayer and practical focus.
- 2. Establish a Monthly Diocesan Mass for Life which could be hosted in different parishes
- 3. Develop more school engagement, with learning and catechetical opportunities for young people around life issues
- 4. Increase opportunities for ongoing adult formation and catechesis through a series of talks or seminars on current prolife issues
- 5. Roll-out a diocesan-wide free baby-bank service for mothers & families
- 6. Promote our prolife mission and priorities online and through our other diocesan communications channels As a diocesan community, we rely on the generosity of others in sharing their time and talents if we are to move forward in this important project. Please pray for the success of this renewed mission, and please consider coming along to the next meeting to offer your own valuable contribution.
