#### **Reflection 2nd Sunday Lent**

Abraham was led to Mount Moriah to offer his son Isaac as a sacrifice to God. What God appears to ask of Abraham is so cruel and unjust. Abraham lived among the Canaanites who practiced human sacrifice. He must somehow have got the idea that God was demanding this deed from him. But God showed otherwise. The story was meant to put an end to human sacrifice to God. Sadly killing in the name of God has been widely practiced down the ages. Kings and heads of state have killed, claiming God's authority and God's blessing in their dark deeds. We have seen some religious fundamentalists killing innocent men, women and children. God does not take pleasure in hurt and pain we inflict to one another.

Jesus took Peter, James and John – the same three who were to witness his Agony in the Garden a few months later – to the top of a high mountain. "It was a wonderful for them to be there! But the purpose of this experience was to comfort and strengthen Jesus and the apostles so that they would be able to go back and face the mess and danger left behind. And how much they needed that strength. For there would come another day and another hill. This time the sky

would be dark. The face of Jesus would be covered with sweat and blood. His clothes would not dazzle- they would be taken from him. For companions he would have two criminals, one of them mocking him. There would be no voice from heaven, only the voice of those who mocked him. The disciples would be shattered and would want no part of what was happening. That is why Jesus felt abandoned and cried out: Father, why have you forsaken me!

The only thing in common would be that Jesus would once again be praying. From this it's clear that what sustained him in bright and dark moments alike was his special relationship with the Father. Hopefully, all of us have some experience of mount tabor, the hill of joy and exaltation. But we are probably more familiar with the Mount of Calvary. What happens is that we tend to go from one to another. On "Tabor" we have glimpsed the beauty of heaven: encouraged, elated, we have thought, "It is good for us to be here" in this working place, with lovely my wife and husband and children. Then we have been plunged into the sorrow of Calvary. Life becomes dark for us. On Calvary by the grace of God we learn to say, "thy will be done". All of us can experience moment of great joy, because in his goodness God allows us to taste on earth the joys of the world to come. However, flitting moments of joy, no matter how wonderful, never satisfy the human heart. What we long for is a permanent state of happiness. But that is impossible on earth. God has a homeland prepared for us at the end of our journey.

### **Motherwell Diocesan Choir**

Just over two weeks ago, on 8<sup>th</sup> February, our Diocesan Choir marked the 40th Anniversary of its first meeting; this meeting was due to be held in the Diocesan Centre, but such was the level of interest in the venture – over 270 people turned up! – that the assembly had to be moved quickly to the cathedral. The numbers soon stabilised to around 90 and have remained fairly consistent ever since; there are currently 87 members on the register, with many of the founding members, including the director, still in harness! The choir's first official engagement was at the National Pilgrimage in Carfin Grotto on Sunday, 4 May 1981.

The original proposal to create a diocesan choir was mooted in 1980 by the late Bishop Francis Thomson, whose vision it was that singers from parishes across the diocese might come together in a central location to rehearse and share ideas on musical repertoire which might be taken back to their own parishes, always ensuring that there would be no conflict of interest between parish and diocesan commitments. The choir was founded on this guiding principle and has sought to uphold it ever since; indeed, the membership currently includes a number of singers, choir directors and organists from across the diocese.

During its 40-year lifespan the choir has participated in many national and diocesan events, including the two Papal Visits and the installations of Bishop Joseph Devine and Bishop Joseph Toal. The choir also sang for the International Pilgrims' Mass in St Peter's Basilica, Rome in 1985 and at the Papal Audience in St Peter's Square; indeed, this latter event is chronicled in the choir's

archive by photos of Pope John Paul II seated in the alto section and also playing a few notes on the keyboard which was used to accompany the ceremony!

The choir continues to serve the Diocese of Motherwell by providing musical accompaniment to the annual timetable of liturgical ceremonies; the lockdowns of the past year, however, have disrupted this timetable and created many challenges for the choir - but have failed to silence it! Rehearsals have continued online and only yesterday, during the Forty Days of Lent, the group notched up its 40<sup>th</sup> Digital Rehearsal, emphasising the testing times in which we live. Whilst these online rehearsals have succeeded in holding the group together and allowed for ongoing musical development, they fall far short of the enjoyable live rehearsals, at which members can interact and engage with colleagues. The Diocesan Choir therefore looks forward to the day when the normal liturgical life of our diocese can resume, and members can return to face-to-face rehearsals.
