

Reflection: 6th Sunday of Easter B.

The first Christian community had been exclusively Jewish. Now comes a turning point-the reception of the first gentiles, the first pagans to receive the grace of Baptism. Paul and Barnabas urge their fellows Jewish to be welcoming towards the gentiles and refrain from imposing useless burden to them, for we are all brothers. And Jesus says: love one another as I have loved you.

St John say: 'My dear friends, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love.'

The best way to know God is to love many things. Love a friend, your wife, your husband, your children, strangers, and you will be on the right way to knowing about God.

There is a big gap between knowing God and loving God. Not to love is not to know God. But when we love, the gap is closed. To love is to know God. Where love is, God is; where God is, love is. Hate is a bad thing. It's bad to hate anything. It is a good thing to love something. When we refuse to love, we build a wall around ourselves. But we ourselves are the first to suffer. We condemn ourselves to loneliness and unhappiness. But when we love, the wall falls down. We open ourselves to others. And we ourselves are the first to benefit. We experience friendship, goodwill, peace and joy.

Because we are made in God's image, each of us has an innate (instinctive) capacity for love. However, for this to happen the heart has to be right. If only the heart was right, we could see God in all he created.

I would invite everyone to attend this in the lead up to Pentecost on the 19th May.


Holy Day of Obligation

Below is some further information about the group. Please take some time to read this and consider joining.

The Men of St. Joseph are a group of men committed to living a life of conversion, integrity, and honesty, acting as a witness for Jesus Christ in daily life, work, social, parish and family settings. The men of this ministry aim to emulate St. Joseph and become better husbands, fathers, sons and brothers. There are no dues and the Men of St. Joseph do not participate in projects or other volunteer efforts as a group, but instead, gather together for sharing among men to help them be a better person, a better family man, and a better member of the Church.

The Five Promises

The Men of St. Joseph are invited to accept the following five promises as a guide for their daily lives:

Dedicate your Life to the Lord:

Participate in Sunday Mass (with your family if you have one).

Grow in Christian Discipleship:

Develop a personal prayer life and attend weekday Mass once a month.

Live with Integrity and Honesty:

Experience the Sacrament of Reconciliation twice a year.

Be Faithful to Your Primary Vocation:

Married: pray and spend time with your family. Singles: pray and act to change the world.

Meet Together with Brothers:

Attend Men of St. Joseph meetings at your parish and gather together with other men for annual and seasonal conferences.

What are some specific activities they do?

The Men of St. Joseph engage in various activities to foster spiritual growth, fraternity, and service. Here are some specific activities commonly associated with this group:

1. Prayer and Reflection:

- o Regular prayer meetings, including the Rosary, Liturgy of the Hours, or Eucharistic Adoration.
- o Spiritual retreats and days of reflection to deepen their relationship with God.

- 2. **Selflessness and Sacrifice**: Joseph put Mary and Jesus' well-being above his own desires. He sacrificed his plans, reputation, and comfort to care for them.
- 3. **Protection and Provision**: As a protector, Joseph shielded Mary and Jesus from harm.
